NOTE FROM THE PRESIDENT:

A major activity we are planning for the coming Audubon year is a workshop for Breeding Bird Atlas volunteers in March. We want to recognize their generous amount of time and expense donated during the last 5 years. The workshop will cover the findings to date and aid in pointing out potential sites and tips on finding some of the more secretive and rare species during the final summer. This inventory of local birds is already spotlighting the remaining high quality habitat in local counties and will help focus our conservation efforts in the future.

CONSERVATION NOTABLES:

The 1990 Farm Bill significantly and affirmatively affects the "Wetlands" conservation program. It expands the CRP program to include lands other than cultivated acres, prohibits wetland draining and provides for fines for doing such, and provides farmers assistance in reducing water pollution and retiring of wetlands.

The Dept. of the Interior has a Wetlands Action Plan for the USFWS to assist in preserving and reestablishing wetlands. Copies are available from: Dept. of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, 1849 C Street, N.W., Room 130, ARLSQ, Washington, DC 20240.

New wetlands poster is available free for a donation to the Non-game Wildlife Conservation Fund. Or, send a \$3 donation for mail delivery of one from the Div. of Natural Heritage. The posters will be available for \$1 at Bald Eagle Days and at the Illinois State Fair.

Maps of Illinois' high-quality streams are currently being prepared by the Non-game Wildlife Conservation Fund.

While we are discussing the Breeding Bird Atlas, please remember that <u>OWLS</u> are already courting and nesting. This is our last spring for observing them and obtaining data for the atlas. Anyone knowing of owls in our vicinity should call Bert Princen (691-0519) or Maury Brucker (493-5181). Your help will be greatly appreciated.

Peoria Audubon Society has written a letter to express our thanks to the <u>Peoria Park District</u> for purchasing the Boy Scout's "Camp Wokanda". For several years, the Boy Scouts will be allowed exclusive use of the area, with the hope that in five years the camp will be made available to the public. NOTE: <u>It is not open to the public yet</u>, and will not be until some transition time elapses; but look forward to enjoying it a few years down the road from now. Camp Wokanda adds 273 wooded acres above the bluff in park lands and will add to the protection of the natural communities along the bluff.

National Audubon's "Audubon Adventures" program for teachers of grades four through six will be offered soon for the 1991-92 school year. In the hopes of obtaining more teacher/class participants, the PAS Board approved the following policy:

For the 1991-92 school year, those teachers currently in the program requiring financial support will receive it, but for the 1992-93 school year they must obtain funding from another source (school, private donar, class money making project, etc.).

Each new teacher will automatically be funded for the first two years of their participation, with their obtaining funding from another source for year number three on. (If financial backing is found from another source, it will free one of our supports for another teacher.)

Costs are \$30 per class of 32 students (if more students are in the class, as additional \$30 will be charged).

At our December "Members Night" membership meeting, Peoria Audubon Society honored one of its most dedicated and long-time members, Bert Princen. He helped to set up the territory for the Peoria Christmas Bird Count back in 1963, headed up the Mid-Winter Bald Eagle Survey in 1965, and became Director of the Peoria Academy of Science in 1966. In 1970 he twice represented the Academy and our Ornithological Section on the popular local radio show TOPIC. In 1977 as President of our section for the first time he helped host the Annual Mtg. of the Ill. Audubon Society held at new Lakeview Museum. In the 1980's he was very instrumental along with our other members in proposing and voting on our becoming an official chapter of National Audubon, our new name becoming the "Peoria Audubon Society". He again was our president from 1986 thru 1988. Bert retired last year as Director of the U. S. Dept. of Agricultural Research Lab in Peoria, and as a gesture of appreciation for his many years of service, Peoria Audubon presented him with a Blue Jay statue/music box. We hope he will continue to share his undying devotion to birding with us for many years to come.

An anonymous member of Peoria Audubon Society has contributed five wood-duck/screech-owl boxes for use in the Farmdale/Fondulac Recreational Areas which arecurrently maintained by the Corps of Engineers. We send our thanks for this generous gift.

RECENT SIGHTINGS:

- Nov. 1 Still 6 Pied-Billed Gremes at Mendenhall.
- Nov. 4 6 Great Blue Herons and 12 Great Egrets at Mendenhall, but by Nov. 6th there were only 5 GBH's and 5 GE's.
- Nov. 6 Linda Nicot saw her first albino Song Sparrow in a drainage ditch in Tazewell County.
- Nov. 16 2 Yellow-Rumped Warblers seen in Peoria County by Eleanor Voeste & Party.
- Nov. 18 13 Common Loons seen on Ill. R. from Hugh Cooper Park; later on Nov. 25 only 5 were seen.
- Nov. 25 several Pied-Billed Grebes at Spring Lake; several Bald Eagles including 2 immatures were seen at Chautauqua Lake boat ramp.
- Dec. 7 4 Hooded Mergansers reported at flooded Mendenhall Park; many Common Mergansers were seen at Powerton.
- The Dept. of Cons. must not have released a lot of Bob-Whites this fall, as few coveys have been seen in the area.
- The Red Crossbills were back earlier than usual at Sand Ridge S.P. per L. Augustine.
- Pine Siskins are visiting feeders for short times, but then moving on—not staying.
- Jan: sightings of Glaucous, Iceland, and Thayer's Gulls have been seen by the bridge from Peoria's downtown post office.
- A Great Black Backed Gull was seen at the Detweiller Marina and also from the dike behind the railroad.
- Jan. 20 Snow Buntings and Lapland Longspurs have been seen on Route 78 on patchy roadsides.
- Jan. 26 Pine Siskins finally arrived at Virginia Humphrey's feeder.
- Many Bald Eagles have been seen at Powerton; and there are a lot of Rough-Legged Hawks and Harriers in the area.

Don't forget to help us cut down on the use of styrofoam cups at our membership meetings by bringing a glass or cup of your own from home. Better yet, bring a second for someone else to use.


Forest Park is also offering (through the Park District) classes on building houses for wrens, bluebirds, and bats. Call the Center for more information: 686-2260.

Time to Stop the Trade in Wild-Caught Birds for Pets

Do you know that there are more than 40 million caged birds in the United States? Most of these birds-parakeets, canaries, zebra finches, and cockatiels--are bred in captivity. But eight million birds, including most parrot species, were trapped in the wild as adults or nestlings.

The United States is the largest market for imported birds. At least half a million birds are imported each year, and thousands die before they ever reach stores. On average, a bird has no better than a 50-50 chance of surviving capture, transport, and sale.

As a result of the dramatic threat posed to many bird species by the pet trade, Audubon staff are involved in a joint effort with the pet industry, bird breeders, zoos, and animal-welfare and conservation groups to solve this urgent problem. The joint effort is known as the Cooperative Working Group on Bird Trade.

The group is lobbying for national legislation to ban the trade in wild-caught birds for pets and is seeking its introduction in Congress some time in the spring of 1991. You can help make a difference by buying only captive-bred birds for pets and encouraging retailers not to sell birds caught in the wild.

This spring Audubon will be launching its own International Wildlife Trade Program. A key component of the program will be an activist kit for chapters and individuals to help educate the public, campaign for bills, and monitor the enforcement of wildlife trade laws. General information on wildlife trade will also be provided for concerned citizens.
