OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE DISABLED TO WATCH BIRDS: Many people who cannot leave their homes because of physical disabilities miss the opportunity to watch birds. The Golden Gate Audubon Soc. of Berkeley, CA, has remedied that situation in its area by initiating a program to provide bird seed and feeders to people confined to their homes. Volunteers donate feeders and seed and periodically return to visit and restock that person's birdseed supply. CLEAN WATER CELEBRATION—SUNDAY/MONDAY MARCH 20/21, 1994: The Illinois Rivers Project started in 1990 with eight schools in Alton, Illinois. This interdisciplinary project to bring students' attention to the importance of clean water, has grown to over 250 high schools in 23 states, including 250 in Illinois. This year's Project 1994 will be held at the Peoria Civic Center. The Sun Foundation is planning the major exhibit and associated programming for the second day in the large exhibition hall.


Students will have an opportunity to set up exhibit booths, together with booths from companies, research institutions and conservation organizations. The III. Audubon Council, the local Sierra Club, Peoria Academy of Science, USDA Agricultural Research Service and Soil and Water Conservation Agency, the III. Dept. of Conservation and many others have already committed to display in their own booths and to sponsor student booths. Even the Governor of Illinois will be there to talk to and be with the students.

CONSERVATION ALERT:

In the Canadian province of Quebec, the energy conglomerate Hydro-Quebec is conducting a project known as the James Bay Project. Phase 1 is completed and has flooded portions of a 4,000 square mile wilderness area. Now Phase 2 is being started without a proper environmental review. Phase 2 will flood an area of 6,000 square miles and destroy a vital waterfowl staging area. Letters need to be sent to the Canadian ambassador to the United States protesting Phase 2 of the James Bay Project. The address is: Honorable Derek H.
