#### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN SEPTEMBER/OCTOBER:

Warblers! We have several field trips during this time, all of which would be good opportunities to see warblers. Bring your field guides, because they are mostly "hiding" in their fall plumage! (Some may be immature, and a few may still be in spring plumage.) Peterson's Field Guide to Eastern Birds has several pages devoted to "Confusing Fall Warblers"! In the fall, warblers show up more sporadically and over a longer period of time than in the spring. They are often seen in family groups looking for insects, and unlike their spring habit of hiding in the very tops of trees, they may be found anywhere.

Brenda has had a good start on warblers in Roanoke Park! On 8/22, she saw Tennessee, Cape May, Redstart, Black & White, and Black-Throated Green. She also saw all of those on 8/29, plus Magnolia, Wilson's, Bay-Breasted, Canada, Ovenbird, and Blackpoll, besides other migrants - Rose-Breasted Grosbeak, Swainson's Thrush, Least Flycatcher - and a Northern Oriole singing!

#### FIELD TRIP REPORTS - Jana Smith

Our Summer Get-Together at McNaughton Park on July 8 was a lot of fun! The group identified 32 species of birds (including a Black-Crowned Night Heron flying over at dusk) and observed bats, fish, frogs, and tiny clams and snails (collected by Brenda's kids). After grabbing some food at McDonald's in North Pekin, we headed back to the park to enjoy a picnic on a blanket near one of the small ponds. We stayed until well after dark, and Les showed us some interesting stars.

On the July 23 Northwood Park field trip, 27 species of birds were counted. Since no one new showed up, the regulars continued the hike at Farmdale Park. We checked the Cooper's Hawk nest and are sad to report that the hawk has apparently given up and left. We saw no sign of her or of any young or eggs. Dan Holm and I have that area for Spring Count, so we'll check for a new nest next year.

Brenda Onken, Dan Holm, and I had a great (for birds, anyway) unofficial hike on July 30. We met at Powerton at 8:00 AM and went to Sand Lake near Havana and Anderson Lake across the river. We identified <u>75</u> species of birds, including 8 species of shorebirds! (I did, however, have an encounter with Rice Cut Grass while wearing shorts - I wouldn't recommend it.)

On another unofficial hike, we walked in 8" deep mud and through 6' tall bulrushes! That was at Big Lake on July 16. That is certainly the exception to the rule and not something we would do on an official hike (unless all parties involved had a hankering for it).

The August 13 field trip to the Peoria Sanitary District ponds was very fruitful! 53 species were seen, including: Lesser Golden Plover, Black-Bellied Plover, Stilt Sandpiper, Short-Billed Dowitcher, Ruddy Turnstone, Caspian Tern, Black Tern, Cliff Swallow, Bank Swallow. Those who went on to Duck Island also saw a Forster's Tern and a Willet!

On August 27 at Matthiesson Park, we saw Tennessee Warbler, Louisiana Waterthrush, Purple Martin, Turkey Vulture, Vesper Sparrow, and Osprey. We found some relief from the hot, humid weather in the canyons.

### BIRD "SPOTLIGHT": BROWN THRASHER - LuAnn Elwood/Jana Smith

As a child, the Brown Thrasher was one of the first birds I learned to recognize. They can be distinguished from similar brown birds, such as thrushes, by their long tails, curved bills, and strange yellow eyes.

At the May 14 Migratory Bird Day Conference, I found Kenneth Schmidt's findings about the reproduction ecology of the American Robin and Wood Thrush interesting. It is sad that predation and parasitism are causing the population decline of forest songbirds. I found hope for the Brown Thrasher, however, as I read Illinois Birds: Mimidae put out by the Natural History Survey in 1970. The report noted that though the this bird suffered from predation by snakes and fox squirrels, cowbird parasitism did not seem to be a problem. When a cowbird egg is placed in a thrasher's nest, the fight is on - thrashers seem to recognize cowbird eggs and discard either the eggs or the unwanted fledglings. The longest cowbird fledglings lasted in any of the nests studied was six days.

In working with Project Feeder Watch, I learned of a woman who offered nutmeats at her feeder, which attracted adult thrashers with their young. The Natural History Survey showed that the Brown Thrasher nested in gooseberry and bittersweet bushes, which I added to my backyard habitat some time ago (no thrasher nests yet!).

#### OTHER ITEMS OF INTEREST

The schedule in effect through May 1995 for membership meetings is: Sep., Oct., Apr., & May on the 2nd Fri. of each month at Forest Park Nature Center; and Nov., Dec., Jan., Feb., & Mar. on the 2nd Wed. of each month at Lakeview Museum. They will all start at 7:00 PM.

Two upcoming programs on PBS's NOVA science series that you may want to catch: "The Great Wildlife Heist" (Oct. 11) explores the illegal trade in rare and endangered birds; and "Haunted Cry of a Long Gone Bird" (Oct. 25) retraces the migration route of the Great Auk and explores the current status of the Northeast's seabirds. Check local listings for exact times.

During the past year, the Illinois Chapter of the Nature Conservancy has been supporting the work of a counterpart organization in Mexico, Pro Natura Peninsula De Yucatan, as part of their international program. An exploratory trip to Mexico is planned for the week of April 23, 1995. Volunteers are needed to help identify important staging areas in Yucatan for spring migrants. The estimated cost of the trip will be about \$1500 or less. For more information, contact Marj Tattersall at 692-2247.

#### **Pending Legislation**

The Safe Drinking Water Act, the Endangered Species Act, and the Clean Water Act are all stalled in Congress, whose attention has turned to the crime bill and the health care plan. Currently, there are two bills pending that involve wetlands: the Mineta bill (HR 3948), which has many serious weaknesses, and the Shuster-Hayes bill (no number as yet), which would weaken what protection wetlands already have. National Audubon opposes both these bills and urges us to write our representatives asking for stronger wetlands protection in the Clean Water Act. #### Forest Legacy - A New Way to Protect Forests

The Forest Legacy protects private ownership and public interests in threatened forests through a program set up in the 1990 Farm Bill. It allows the U.S. Forest Service to purchase permanent conservation easements from willing landowners at fair market value. Specific terms of the easement may vary according to the wishes of the landowner and the particular area to be protected. The easement purchase would remain in effect even though ownership of the property might change.

The land eligible for this program in the Peoria area consists of the forests along the bluffs on both sides of the Illinois River from Cedar Hills Drive to Marshall County.
