WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN NOV./DEC. - Maury Brucker
Bald Eagles have started arriving in the Illinois River valley
for the winter from their breeding grounds in Canada. Large
numbers of ducks and geese will be moving through this
flyway in these months. With no-till corn fields, I now see
more flocks moving in late afternoon from the river to feed in
corn stalk fields. The various species of American sparrows
are the rear guard of the fall passerine migration. But then
toward the middle of December, birds from Canada which
winter here will arrive. Juncos come early, and the winter
finches arrive soon thereafter.

Jan. 28 (Sat.): Bald Eagle Day at Forest Park Nature Center. More information in next newsletter.



#### FIELD TRIP REPORTS - Jana Smith

On the September 10 canoe trip on the Fox River near Ottawa, we observed 28 species of birds. The fun-loving people who went were Joe Laszlo, Holly Love, Brenda Onken, Dan Holm, Les ("The Wettest of Them All") Bodell, Mary Bodell, and me. On the way home, we ate at Duffy's, an 1890's pub in Utica, where the food and the atmosphere are both good.

The Jubilee Harvest Fest and bird hike on September 17 were enjoyed by Les, Brenda, Dan, and me. 20 species of birds were counted, and mass quantities of good food were consumed! Roasted corn-on-the-cob, freshly-baked bread and cinnamon rolls, corn stew, and apple slices covered with hot caramel were just some of the delicacies available. Brenda manned the Audubon booth (also on September 18) in the old-fashioned blouse and long skirt we coaxed her into wearing!

Les, Mary, Brenda, and I were foolish enough to hike 26 miles on the Rock Island Trail from Alta to Toulon on October 9. We were all sore by the 21st mile at Wyoming (with the exception of Brenda, with whom we were mildly annoyed for being in such good shape). I think I was in the worst shape, even though I was the youngest one there. My husband, Jerry, rode 80 miles back and forth on his mountain bike, and we were mildly annoyed with him, too, because he could have ridden another 80. We do plan to do this again some time, but some of us have vowed to get into better shape first! (We did identify 46 species of birds!)

Our wiener roast on October 15 at McNaughton Park in Pekin was fun, but only the usual few were there - Les, Mary, Brenda, and I - plus my husband, Jerry. We ate hot dogs (of course), potato salad, baked beans, and s'mores and talked about hundreds of subjects around the fire.

BIRD "SPOTLIGHT": PURPLE FINCH - Brenda Onken The Purple Finch is a delightful little bird that migrates from its nesting area in the northern United States to winter with us here in Central Illinois. It may be found in woodlands, forest edges, and even parks, but is most likely to be observed at winter feeders.

Roger Tory Peterson describes the male Purple Finch "like a sparrow dipped in raspberry juice". The female is brown and sparrow-like with broad streaks on her breast and a broad jaw stripe. This bird is often confused with the House Finch. but the male House Finch is more red than purple and more brown on the back. The female House Finch has finer streaks.

Hopefully, you will get to see Purple Finches at your feeder this winter. They are especially fond of sunflower seeds.

HAWK WATCH DAY REPORT - Richard Biorklund Tom Lerczak and I participated in Hawk Watch Day from the Sand Dome at Gleason Nature Preserve in Sand Ridge Forest on October 1. Here are the results: 31 Turkey

Vultures, 1 Osprey, 1 Bald Eagle (immature), 8 Sharp-Shinned Hawks, 1 Cooper's Hawk, 10 Broad-Winged Hawks, 19 Red-Tailed Hawks, 2 unidentified Buteos, and 1 unidentified Accipiter, for a total of 74 birds of prey.

No "kettles" (large groups of migrating hawks) were observed, except for the initial activity of the Turkey Vultures. It was interesting to see a naive juvenile Red-Tailed Hawk make a very close pass at my plastic Great Horned Owl, which was mounted on a fence post!
