WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN JAN./FEB - Maury Brucker
Finding birds on a sunny winter day in Illinois is a special
delight. Tree Sparrows, Juncos, Cardinals, Chickadees,
woodpeckers, and other species can be found feeding in
mixed flocks. So walk briskly until you find a flock, then take
time to let all the species show themselves. Winter is the
only time to find Rough-Legged Hawks, Snowy Owls, and
Northern Shrikes in this area. Let other birders know if you
spot these birds, because they do settle down in winter
feeding territories. Watch your feeders for winter finches.
Once in awhile in areas with food protected from the wind, a
late robin may be seen.

BIRD "SPOTLIGHT": CAROLINA WREN - Brenda Onken
The Carolina Wren is a rather large wren that is reddish
brown on the back and wings and buffy below. Above its eye
is a prominent white eyebrow stripe. Like most wrens, its tail
often sticks straight up. It is most likely to be found in
bottomland woods and brushy undergrowth. These wrens
tend to stay low, but will come up occasionally to sit on a log
or stump and sing "tea-kettle, tea-kettle, tea-kettle, tea".
When you are out in the woods and hear this song, do try to
find the singer. It is a joy to see this wren in the winter.

As a result of severe winters, the Carolina Wren population suffered a drastic decline in the late 1970's. The birds that did survive these bad winters did so by visiting feeders and seeking shelter in old outbuildings and garages. There has been good news, though, for the last several years. Christmas bird counts have indicated a good recovery for these dear little birds. If you live near the woods, check your feeder for a possible visit from a Carolina Wren.

CONSERVATION - Les Bodell (309) 745-5479 Bird Seed Sale

Thanks again to Bert & Green Princen for their efforts in organizing the annual bird seed sale, jointly held by Friends of the Rock Island Trail & Peoria Audubon Society. They had just been home an hour from their South American trip when their phone started ringing with our requests for help. It was our best year yet in terms of pounds sold.

Peoria-to-Chicago Corridor

On November 29, I attended a meeting with Hal Gardner, the Sierra Club Conservation Chair, and Gary McConkey (and other staff members) of the Illinois Department of Transportation. The purpose of the meeting was to bring us up to date on the proposed Peoria-to-Chicago corridor. Although it is still in the feasibility stage of planning, it appears it would take one of 4 possible routes. One possible route would run along the bluff from just outside Peoria to I-80 near Hennepin. This route could be devastating to the ecology along the river bluff, cost millions, and according to IDOT personnel, save only 10 minutes of travel time. CORRECTION regarding open areas at Chautauqua:

Because of the Lake Chautauqua Habitat Rehabilitation & Enhancement Project (HREP), which is scheduled to extend through 1995, the following areas are closed: Boatyard #3 access area; north levee; crossdike; access road from Recreation Area to crossdike; and south levee.

From January 15 through October 15, all of the Refuge except for the HREP area is open for wildlife observation. From October 16 through January 14, only the land area from the Refuge Headquarters to the Recreation Area is open. Certain areas of the Refuge are closed during this time to lessen the disturbance of migrating waterfowl and bald eagles.
