WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN JULY/AUGUST - Maury Brucker Summer birding in Central Illinois tends to center around nesting behavior. This activity can extend into August, as some species have two or even three broods. Walking very early or very late in the day becomes imperative, not only to coincide with the active periods of the birds but also for the comfort of the birder. The behavior of a bird provides the clues to nest location and then to the young birds hanging around for a meal. Nesting success or productivity is the evidence of good breeding habitat for each species. Note the features of the habitat around nests and young such as the mix of plant species, density and texture of cover, food sources, water, etc. The continuing existence of good habitat is key to the presence of birds in our area and our pleasure in watching them. (Footnote: sharing observations magnifies their value.)

The Bird-A-Thon on May 13 in Peoria County was a success in spite of the rainy, windy weather. Two teams saw 105 species each, and the other team saw 73 species, for a grand total of 132 species in 12 hours by 7 observers. The financial side was also a great success, with approximately \$850 collected so far for the Peoria Audubon Society, Forest Park Nature Center, Wildlife Prairie Park, and Partners in Flight. 

BIRD "SPOTLIGHT":

ROSE-BREASTED GROSBEAK - Brenda Onken I enjoyed seeing groups of beautiful warblers and other migrants this spring on their journey north to nest. Some neo-tropical birds, such as the Rose-Breasted Grosbeak. stay in central Illinois to breed and raise their young.

This bird has a beautiful song, which has been compared to a Robin that has had voice lessons! The male and female are very different in appearance. The male has a black and white pattern with a triangle of rosy red on a whitish breast. The female resembles a large sparrow with an eyebrow stripe and streaks on the breast.

The Rose-Breasted Grosbeak can be found in deciduous woods and hedgerows with big shrubs. This bird feeds on many insects that are pests, such as tent caterpillars and gypsy moths. This fall, they will migrate south to Mexico and South America for the winter.

Rescission Bill Veto

Congratulations to President Clinton on his first veto! Antienvironmental provisions were important in choosing to exercise the veto upon the Rescission Bill, especially the "forest salvage" mandate to cut two million board feet of dead, diseased, or potentially diseased trees on federal land in the next three years. It would suspend all federal laws in the process, including the Endangered Species Act, the Clean Water Act, and others. The veto decision was influenced by more than 30,000 calls and e-mail messages on this issue. You can voice your opinion and thank President Clinton for this key veto by calling the White House Opinion Line at (202) 456-1111.

Dirty Water Bill

The Clean Water Act Reauthorization, H.R. 961, also known as the Schuster Dirty Water Bill, passed the House recently and will soon be acted upon in the Senate. Among its many faults, this act strips protection from most small wetlands. Over 78% of all wetlands in the Prairie Pothole states are less than one acre in size and 50% of all ducks produced in the lower 48 states depend on small wetlands in the Dakotas to provide food and breeding habitat. Please write Senators Simon and Moseley-Braun to oppose this bill.

Illinois Riverwatch Network

The environmental committee of Peoria Audubon plans to participate in the Illinois Riverwatch Network by monitoring water quality in Crow Creek and possibly other streams. Please let me know if you would like to be involved. A training session will be held soon.
