Birding on the Banks of the Mackinaw by Brenda Onken

On a recent visit to the Mackinaw River with some friends. I was delighted at the number of birds I heard and saw. Throughout the day, the birds kept singing. It was a very warm day and the birds were very active.

The Warbling Vireo and the Red-eyed Vireo were singing away. I didn't get to see them since the leaves were doing a good job of hiding them. House wrens were busy with their babies, Baltimore Orioles were flying around and chattering. Bank Swallows had their nest made in a tall bank. There were several lines of holes, and the swallows were all flying around. It was quite a sight.

The robins were all upset. I expect an Owl... Yep, there it goes, through the woods. I think that it was a Great Horned. Joining the protesting Robins was a Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Indigo Buntings were numerous and the males were singing from high perches. They are such a vibrant shade of blue. I also heard an Eastern Bluebird as I approached a clearing. The Song Sparrow showed up at several locations along the river. I also picked up a Vespers Sparrow singing in the distance. "Whichity-whichity-witch" pipes the Common Yelowthroat as it sticks to the dense brushy growth. Out in front of me flew the Great Blue Heron down the river. The Green Heron was there also, stopping along a gravelbar to do a little fishing.

Also along the gravelbars were Killdeer with their babies. Everybody knows how cute Killdeer babies are! A Spotted Sandpiper was also bobbing along the gravel in search of invertebrates.

"Pee-a-wee." Off in the distance an Eastern Wood Pee-Wee sounds off. Soon the Eastern Phoebe joins the chorus. Here and there woodpeckers would call. Red Headed, Downy, and Redbellied Woodpeckers were joined by a Flicker. Chickadees, Tufted Titmice and White-breasted Nuthatches were all flitting about. The Cardinal and Catbird came out to the edge of a clearing. Deeper in the woods the song of the Woodthrush echoed. In contrast, the sharp rattle of the Belted Kingfisher sounded as it flew downstream. Amongst all of this birdsong, the Bluejay's were there but unusually quiet.

A day along the Mackinaw proved to be a very productive and enjoyable one. I just hope that I didn't forget to mention anyone. Have fun birding!

Chautauqua News... In the June /July issue of Bird's Eye View, I made an error in the description of Dr. Bjorklund's Species lists. The Sand Ridge State Forest Checklist is up to 209 species. The "Chautauqua Checklist" is quite different and is actually the Illinois River Refuge Checklist (comprising 4 units) and has 253 species plus 17 rare and accidentals.
