CBC Turns 100...

One Hundred years ago, in an effort to save our bird species, ornithologists started the tradition of the Christmas Bird Count (CBC). The established tradition of that time was to walk off the holiday meal by shooting birds while strolling the countryside. All of us are glad that the birding tradition has changed! The 100th year was a blockbuster for all three counts that involved Peoria Audubon Members. The Peoria Count was held on Saturday, December 18, The Chautauqua Count was held on Thursday, December 23, and the Chillicothe Count was held on Sunday, January 2. All three counts either tied or broke the record for the number of species seen and both Peoria and Chillicothe broke their records for the number of individual birds seen. Peoria Audubon has been conducting annual Christmas Bird Counts starting in 1963, which was the first year of the Peoria Count. Locally, Dr. Bert Princen was instrumental in organizing the first CBC. Since then he and his wife Greet have participated in over 100 CBC's and was recently honored at the January membership meeting with the gift of a commemorative desk clock as a "thank you" from the members of Peoria Audubon.

Bird Fact Corner...

Nesting Bald Eagle's in Illinois are making a comeback. While we still don't have the official numbers for 1999's nesting season, things are looking good. Next issue of Bird's-Eye-View, we will look at winter population trends in the state.

Focus on outstanding Audubon Members...

Dr. Richard and Sigurd Bjorklund received the Volunteer of the Year award from the US Fish and Wildlife Service for the years of 1997, 1998, and 1999. What a way to end a millennium! This father/son team has conducted weekly census of the Chautauqua National Wildlife Refuge raptor and waterbird species for several years. This information has become essential to the USFWS in evaluating the success of management practices and helps them provide the best habitat possible for these birds.

Dr. L.H. (Bert) and Greet Princen were presented with an appreciation award from The Peoria Audubon Society for their dedication to Christmas Bird Counts and Spring Counts. On this 100th anniversary of the Christmas Bird Count, Bert and Greet have helped organize or partaken in over 100 Christmas Birdcounts throughout Central Illinois. Bert and Greet were instrumental in starting the local CBC's that we participate in, and they were also trendsetters for the State of Illinois by establishing the first Spring Count which since then has become a statewide census.

Dr. Maury Brucker and Emiko Yang received the 1999 Conservation Award from the Illinois Audubon Society for the work that they have done in the restoration of savanna and hillprairie remnants at Hopewell Estates in Marshall County. These areas were threatened by development for homesites. Maury and Emiko took it upon themselves to purchase individual tracts, restore their beleaguered habitats and in many cases permanently protect them through dedication as Illinois State Nature Preserves.
