Peoria Audubon meets at 7:00 on the second Wednesday of every month, September through May (holiday potluck starts earlier) It's a relaxed, friendly evening with an interesting presentation followed by refreshments. Free and open to the public.



Kankakee Sands is located in northeastern Illinois, about an hour south of Chicago on the Indiana border. This expansive preserve takes its name from its sandy soils, which support globally-significant oak barrens, prairies and sedge meadows. This oak savanna ecosystem offers rich habitat for birds, insects and small animals. Kankakee Sands presents an unequalled opportunity to protect a naturally-functioning landscape, which remains almost unchanged since pre-settlement times.

In 1996 the Nature Conservancy acquired the 7,209-acre Kankakee Sands Preserve. It is surrounded by several high-quality, protected natural areas, creating a single, landscapescale conservation area.

These 25-plus square miles of unfragmented habitat support unusual combinations of bird species: the declining northern bobwhite quail, bobolink and the red-headed woodpecker. It's home to the threatened plains pocket gopher, the regal fritillary and blue racer butterflies, and to a number of state-listed plant species. 
#### October 18 in Bloomington:

# **Avian flu and birding** It <u>is</u> safe to watch and feed wild birds, especially in North America, where the highly pathogenic H5N1 virus <u>has not</u> been detected. Here's 6 facts, courtesy of Cornell Lab of Ornitholgy: www.birds.cornell.edu/birdflu

- 1. Avian flu viruses have circulated in birds worldwide for thousands of years, and most pose no threat to birds or humans.
- 2. Avian flu causes fewer deaths by far than other types of flu. In the United States alone, about 36,000 people die each year from complications of seasonal flu. By contrast, in the past three years, 139 people worldwide have died from the highly pathogenic H5N1 avian flu virus, and none in the United States.
- 3. Nearly all cases of human illness from the H5N1 virus have been associated with close contact with diseased poultry or poultry products.
- 4. The H5N1 virus is not easily transmitted from person to person. It is remotely possible that the virus could mutate to more dangerous forms but no one knows when, if at all, this might occur.
- 5. The H5N1 virus has been detected in only 45 (out of millions of) wild bird species. Most noted outbreaks have been among waterfowl.
- 6. Wild birds are capable of carrying the H5N1 virus with them when they migrate, but in most cases so far the virus appears to have spread to new locations through the transportation of infected poultry and poultry products.

# rservation National Issues:

#### **COURT REINSTATES ROADLESS FOREST PROTECTIONS**

On Sept. 20, Magistrate Judge Elizabeth Laporte of the U.S. District Court in San Francisco sided with four attorneys general and environmental groups - including the National Audubon Society - in reinstating the 2001 Roadless Rule. This is an important victory for conservation, reinstating protection from road construction, logging and mining in 58.5 million acres - safeguarding one-third of our U.S national forests.

The Bush Administration had reversed its own pledge to uphold the 2001 rule. Conservation groups, in addition to protesting the administration's decision on legal grounds, also said the change ignored the 1.7 million who opposed the Bush rule during the 2004 comment period

- Don't take for granted that hunted areas will be clearly marked with warning signs.

#### HISTORIC PRAIRIE, SIGN NEAR JUBILEE COLLEGE THREATENED

A number of local organizations are opposing Jubilee Township's bid to claim to a 1.6 acre parcel of land. This land was donated in 1860 by the family of Jubilee College founder Bishop Philander Chase "for public use forever". This small area is ecologically valuable because it has retained a complex prairie ecosystem, which contains at least 45 native plants, some rare and/or endangered.

Jubilee Township has declared its intention to sell the land to the highest bidder. Although this is contrary to the donor's wish of "public use forever", the public recipient was not specified in the will. If the township succeeds in selling the land, the precious native prairie would most likely be destroyed.

The landmark sign "Jubilee College State Historic Site and Park" stands on this site. The Illinois Historic Preservation Agency and Jubilee Prairie Dawgs - who restored and have maintained the site for many years - and the Illinois Native Plant Society and Heart of Illinois Sierra Club have so far hindered the township.

Peoria Audubon Board stands with these organizations. We believe the title should be with the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency, as this would respect the donor's wishes to remain in public use forever and remain connected with Jubilee College. The Board asks Peoria Audubon members to contact Rep. David Leitch with your views, as he is trying to mediate between the two agencies' interests. His local address is: 3114 N.
